NEW ADRIAN GROUP HOME WAITING TO SERVE YOUTH

Genacross Family & Youth Services held an Open House for its Adrian Group Home on September 30. Nearly 200 individuals toured the new home that was built from the ground up on land donated to the organization many years ago.

Among the attendees were multiple officials from local school districts, a Lenawee County Commissioner, and representatives from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS). Conversations focused on the different youth that may be placed in the home, appropriate school settings, and the best ways to meet the needs of the youth that will come into care.

Final inspections are pending for the home, which can serve up to 10 youth at a time. "We have scheduled a final review of our policies and procedures, as well as an on-site visit by our Michigan licensing consultant in December," reported Executive Director Katie Zawisza. "We expect to have all paperwork submitted by the end of the year, so we can open the Adrian Group Home in January 2022.

Changing to meet needs

Recently, Genacross announced plans to sell our Toledo Campus to Majestic Care. The decision to sell was not an easy one. Since 1906, when the Lutheran Old Folks' Home opened its doors, caring for elders has been a significant part of the organization's operations. The Toledo Campus is where we began our journey into caring for older adults along with children in need. Over the years, the campus has evolved with expansions and

renovations that have helped us meet the changing needs of society.

Now, however, the Toledo Campus buildings are in need of capital improvements in order to remain competitive in today's health care market. Unfortunately, Genacross has been unable to fund the needed improvements. By finding a new owner/operator with more capability and capital for renovations, we are ensuring that the campus will continue to serve those in need.

Genacross continues to meet the needs of individuals on the east side of Toledo in multiple ways. Our independent living communities (Luther Hills, Luther Ridge, and Luther Grove) provide affordable housing to seniors with limited incomes. In addition, several group homes in the area serve at-risk youth by providing a safe and nurturing environment. In partnership with Majestic Care, Genacross at Home will also provide home health care to patients discharged from the Toledo Campus.

As we look to our future, Genacross remains committed to providing services that fit within our ability to make a positive impact. For example, we eagerly await the opening of our new Family & Youth Services home in Adrian, Michigan, in early 2022. Furthermore, we are engaged in master planning for our Napoleon Campus to ensure that we provide the right mix of services to meet future needs. The addition of more independent living and memory care are likely outcomes of this planning process. As more people receive care in their homes, we are also well-positioned to grow our home health ministry.

There are times in the life cycle of an organization when it is necessary to change focus to meet the evolving needs of society. Genacross has made adjustments many times during its 160-year history. I am confident that the moves we are making today, while difficult, will position us for a vibrant future meeting the needs of all we are called to serve.

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GENACROSS INITIATES SALE OF TOLEDO CAMPUS

On November 15, Genacross Lutheran Services announced that it has reached an agreement to sell the Genacross Lutheran Services-Toledo Campus. The Genacross Board of Directors has approved the terms of the sale, and the transfer of ownership is expected to be finalized by the end of 2021.

Majestic Care will be the new operator. Based in Westfield, Indiana, Majestic Care has 31 facilities in Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, and Ohio. They provide community-based skilled nursing care, including short-term rehabilitation, therapy services, memory care, long-term care, and hospice care.

As part of the sale, employees of the Toledo Campus will transition to Majestic Care. While the sale is being completed, all operations at the Toledo Campus will continue as normal and staffing levels will be maintained.

"Employees will play a significant role in the transition by continuing to provide quality care and services for our residents and patients," said Rick Marshall, President/CEO.

The day after the announcement, the CEO of Majestic Management, Bernie McGuinness, visited the Toledo Campus. Then, over the next couple of days, Majestic Care human resources representatives came to the campus to help employees begin the transition.

"We are thrilled to welcome the team to Majestic Care of Toledo, where they join our growing family of post-acute care communities," Mr. McGuinness said. "This community adds to the Majestic family an incredibly beautiful campus...a trusted provider in post-acute care."

"We are so excited to continue the outstanding traditions of quality care and faith on the campus while meeting the needs

of the local health care community," he added. "We are planning a significant campus-wide remodel to start in early 2022."

The fact that Majestic Care has a strong history of investment in facilities they have purchased is one of the main reasons Genacross selected them as the new owner. The historic Toledo Campus, which opened in 1953 and has been expanded and renovated numerous times, is in need of numerous capital improvements that Genacross has been unable to fund.

"I am confident that we have found a new owner/operator who will ensure that the Toledo Campus will continue to serve those in need in east Toledo and Oregon for years to come," Mr. Marshall said. "Majestic Care has the financial resources and industry expertise to make it happen."

The Toledo Campus, located on the border of east Toledo and Oregon, provides long-term care and assisted living services, as well as short-term rehabilitation at The Labuhn Center. The campus is also the ministry home for many Genacross team members who faithfully serve residents and patients.

"We are excited about adding over 80 care team members to the Majestic family, and we are humbled to keep so many talented health care providers within the community," Mr. McGuinness said.

Creekside changes target improved resident experience

Genacross leadership has implemented

several changes to enhance the resident experience at Creekside Condominiums on the Genacross Lutheran Services-Wolf Creek Campus. These enhancements include the staffing additions of a service coordinator and activities director and a renewed emphasis on resident dining.

The aim of service coordination is to connect residents to supportive services that foster independent living. After engaging in discussions with residents, Service Coordinator Anna Queen has provided such resident-centered services as routine wellness screenings, vaccine clinics, and home health resources. Overall, the service coordinator works to enhance the self-sufficiency of each Creekside resident.

The new Activities Director, Karen Stevens, has been introducing engaging entertainers and activities to the residents. Harpist Rebecca Swett gave a performance in October, and residents have been having fun with new crafts and cardio drumming classes. In December, a magician is on the activities schedule, as well as a beautiful Christmas dinner with a return performance by the harpist.

Through the team efforts of new dietary managers Jane Sharp and Valerie DeGideo, Creekside now serves breakfast and dinner each weekday, with many items made from scratch. "These home-cooked meals are steadily gaining popularity, and resident participation in the dining room has tripled," said Ashlee Jones, Creekside Manager.

"Creekside staff has put a great deal of time and energy into modifications to make the community more attractive and add value for residents," Ms. Jones stated. Veterans Day on November 11 was a special day of celebration at the Genacross Lutheran Services-Napoleon Campus. Staff at the Napoleon Campus recognized two residents who have served honorably in branches of the United States Armed Forces.

Resident Fred "Coach" Church served as a paratrooper in the U.S. Army during World War II, and resident Sam Ash served in the U.S. Air Force during the Korean War. Each veteran enjoyed a steak dinner with all the trimmings and received a memorial pin.

As Napoleon Campus Chaplain Lee Genter placed the pins on their lapels, he said: "We, the people of the United Stated of America, honor you this day by saying 'thank you' for your honorable service. Your sacrifice is still bearing its good fruit even to this day. Because of you, we still are the land of the free and the home of the brave. Once again, thank you, and may God give you great pride and joy in what you have done for

Mr. Church, a 96-year-old veteran, was a paratrooper stationed in the South Pacific and was often one of the first on the ground. "It was tough," he stated. "I had to make many hard decisions. I have carried those painful experiences with me all my life. You can never forget them as long as you live."

For that bravery and a multitude of other reasons, the Napoleon Campus, like many Genacross ministries, takes time each year to honor those who have served their country.

"And, then, notice the people to whom this royal birth was announced: not to the emperor, or governor, or king, or high priest, or some other big shot; instead, God

> sent the angels to regular folks tending sheep," Dr. Dumke added. "The angel's message, of course, tells it all: 'I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people...' (Luke 2:10)."

> "Just as the Christmas message was and is for all people," Dr. Dumke concluded, "so Genacross provides compassionate care and services to all who need them - as Jesus did in his ministry and calls us to do in ours. After all, completing our mission means living the equality and justice revealed by our Lord."



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HOUSING RESIDENTS BENEFIT FROM ON-SITE CLINICS

During the fall months, the Genacross affordable housing sites have held on-site flu and/or COVID-19 booster shot clinics for residents. Each housing site normally schedules annual flu shot clinics to help protect its residents, and this year COVID-19 vaccine booster shots were added to the lineup.

"The in-house clinics are a huge help to the residents who can't get out," stated Arlena Williams, Service Coordinator for Luther Haus senior community in Temperance, Michigan. Some of the residents are homebound due either to transportation issues or physical challenges.

The clinics are also helpful to immunocompromised residents who, with COVID-19 cases spiking again, are not comfortable with going out to be vaccinated. "I think the in-house clinics reduced the residents' stress," she added. "It's one less thing they have to worry about."

"The vaccine clinics offer residents the convenience and comfort of receiving a shot close to home," said Anna Queen, Service Coordinator for Luther Crest and Luther Woods senior communities in Toledo.

"I am glad I did not have to go out to get my booster shot," said Luther Crest resident Barbara Oehlers. "My great grandson...has cancer so I wanted to get the booster to be around him for the holidays."
