RADIANT ALLIANCE SHARES EXPERTISE

One of the benefits of Genacross Lutheran Services joining Radiant Alliance is leveraging expertise from each organization to enhance clinical quality and best practices. Starting in April, United Church Homes (UCH) began providing clinical expertise to the nursing teams at the Wolf Creek and Napoleon campuses.

"Partnering with UCH leadership gives our directors of nursing and their teams a resource to go to with questions," said Lorinda Schalk, Senior Vice President of Finance & Operations. "This relationship provides us with ongoing clinical expertise and additional support for our teams in times of need."

Some of the clinical benefits to Genacross include quality assurance, MDS compliance and review, and implementation of processes that positively impact resident care.

Specifically, the partnership focuses on several key areas: electronic medical records evaluation/clinical services process review, including nursing and nurse aide documentation, wound treatment plans, and MDS assessments; clinical strategy development and support, including case mix index and quality measures; coaching and support of clinical leadership; annual mock survey; Ohio Department of Health survey support; and high-risk incident support.

"The UCH clinical operations team is supporting the clinical teams at Wolf Creek and Napoleon to improve clinical processes, which will enhance resident care," said Debbie




Durbin, UCH Executive Director of Clinical Operations. "We really enjoy working together toward positive outcomes."

Our recent affiliation with Radiant Alliance brings many new opportunities. With the scale that comes from our partnership, Genacross will be in a better position to serve more individuals with complementary programming. We will also be able to offer more robust models of care that can address needs in a more proactive manner. By doing so, we will contribute to healthier individuals and communities. Economies realized will also position Genacross to expand to new geographic areas that can benefit from our program offerings.

MINIATURE HORSES BRING JOY AT WOLF CREEK CAMPUS

The excitement is tangible on the Genacross Lutheran Services-Wolf Creek Campus when Paws and Hooves Animal Therapy is scheduled to bring their miniature horses and dogs to visit with residents.

"I can recall one resident telling me she would only get out of bed if she could see a horse, and lucky for her, the next day there was one in the hallway," said Activity Director Vicki



Ropp. "She could not believe it, but she kept her word and was up in her chair that day loving on the mini horse."

"Horses are so calming for the elderly," explained Anne Foltz, owner of Paws and Hooves Animal Therapy. "They have slow heart rates, so when the horses are next to the residents, the residents' heartbeats slow to match the horses and they instinctively relax."

According to Ms. Foltz, each horse interacts differently with residents. They just know what each resident needs, and they adapt their behaviors to match.

"The amount of love that our residents feel from the visits with Bourbon and Stormy is immeasurable," stated Ms. Ropp, who said the popular animals are scheduled to return in August. "The smiles, hugs and kisses exchanged are so good for the soul."

Therapy animals provide the opportunity for enhanced resident engagement.

LUTHER HAUS RESIDENTS REMEMBER ORPHANS' HOME

When Martha Amborski and Dorothy Koziarski were young girls, they lived with their five siblings at the Lutheran Orphans' Home in east Toledo. Decades later, the two sisters live at Luther Haus senior community in Temperance, Michigan. Both of these homes belong to the organization, even though the orphanage closed in 1964.

Martha, who is currently 87 years old, was just 6 when she moved into the Orphans' Home with her 4-year-old sister Dorothy, who is now 85. They moved in after their father left and their mother needed help raising them. The siblings lived there for about seven years, while their mother worked and visited them whenever she could find the time. Dorothy remembers visiting outside under the trees with her mother, who always brought them a treat.

Both sisters remember the orphanage fondly. They recall running around and playing outside, going swimming at the lake, attending church every Sunday, and celebrating Christmas and all the holidays. They also had chores while living there. They took care of the farm animals, picked vegetables, and learned to make their beds properly.

According to Martha and Dorothy, moving them to the orphanage was the best thing their mother could have done for them, and they are thankful. They are happy to still be associated with the same organization that cared for them years ago, and Genacross is honored to again be providing a home for the sisters.

Genacross is audited and inspected both internally and externally on a regular basis throughout all of its ministries. Externally, for instance, the organization is audited and/or inspected by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in the Home & Community Based Services ministry; the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) audits Family & Youth Services; the Ohio Department of Health surveys both our Napoleon and Wolf Creek campuses and Genacross at Home; and the Ohio Department of Aging audits waiver services at various settings.

Melanie Moore, Director of Compliance and Risk Management, conducts internal audits and inspections. They are conducted in collaboration with various team members. "For example, when we are preparing for a HUD physical inspection, the Director of Maintenance and his team all collaborate to walk the housing site to ensure that everything is in tip-top shape," Ms. Moore said.

"It truly takes a team effort to provide quality of service and maintain compliance," Ms. Moore explained. "When we all work together, we can achieve great things and be the organization that the community wants to come to for a variety of services."

SECOND HOUSING POCKET PARK FOCUSES ON THE MIND

enacross Lutheran Services recently opened its second senior adaptive pocket park for the residents at its Luther Crest and Luther Woods joint campus in west Toledo. The ribbon-cutting ceremony to dedicate the pocket park was held on July 11.

The newest park focuses on the mind to boost memory and alertness. It was built around the existing Luther Crest gazebo and features benches, a table for chess and checkers,

garden sculptures, and updated landscaping.

"This park will mean so much to our current and future residents," said Mike George, Executive Director of the Genacross Lutheran Services Foundation. "It's a beautiful place to gather with friends and enjoy a game of chess. We hope the park embodies our sense of community."

The second mind-focused park is made possible by grants from the Terhune Fund at KeyBank, Rolf Goffman Martin Lang, LLP, and Country Garden Club of Perrysburg. Supreme Outdoors, LLC, was the landscaping contractor that designed and created the park.

The pocket park project was created to offer Genacross residents socialization opportunities and overall health and wellness experiences. The first pocket park was completed

in 2023 and centers around the environment to promote relaxation and healing.

Genacross has plans for another pocket park focusing on the body. Each of the parks is accessible for older adults and those with mobility challenges.

The new pocket park surrounds the existing gazebo on the property.

"While at Genacross, the staff provided hands-on support and treatment for these two as they persevered through school," said Executive Director Katie Zawisza. "We watched them grow and learn every day to make the improvements necessary to transition into the next stage of their lives. Everybody was so very proud to celebrate their special graduation days."

Just after graduation, the young woman moved into a home health care setting that will continue to support her ongoing needs. The young man will move back to Michigan before the end of summer to a care setting that will provide for his needs as he transitions into adulthood.

AN EVENING WITH JIM TRESSEL TO BENEFIT GENACROSS


