GENACROSS DONATES GROUP HOMES FOR NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT

The shared vison of three local organizations to rejuvenate neighborhoods and provide home ownership opportunities has resulted in the transformation of four former group homes owned by Genacross Lutheran Services. The lengthy process took unoccupied houses and transformed them into quality, safe and affordable homes for new owners.

Over a year ago, Genacross recognized the opportunity to turn its four unoccupied group homes on Seaman Street in east Toledo into assets for both the community and potential buyers. Seeking a purposeful way to revive the properties while addressing housing needs, in March of 2024, Genacross gifted the four houses to NeighborWorks Toledo Region (NTR) to be rehabilitated for homeownership.

"Partnering with NeighborWorks allowed us to gift the unused properties in a way that would make a positive impact on our community," stated Rick Marshall, Genacross President/CEO. "We are thrilled to see these four houses be renovated and used to provide a safe and affordable option for each new homeowner."

"We are very grateful for having been selected by Genacross for this partnership," said Bill Farnsel, NeighborWorks Toledo Region CEO. "The supply of single-family homes in our community that are both affordable and energy efficient is very short. The successful completion of the homes on Seaman Street represents a major neighborhood improvement and evidence that neighborhood partnerships work."

A Case for Social Ministry

Martin Luther taught that being saved by grace frees each of us to serve others. He put this into practice by establishing the Common Chest, a fund to support orphans, widows, education, and medical care. This wasn't just charity – it was a way to break cycles of poverty and build stronger communities. As Lutherans immigrated to America and established churches, they also built schools, hospitals, and care institutions; laying the foundation for modern social ministry.

Today, over 300 Lutheran health and human services organizations, like Genacross Lutheran Services, stand as a continuing testimony to the legacy of Martin Luther. Lutheran social ministries are trusted, community-centered organizations that have long supported the well-being of individuals in need. Our work includes strengthening families; upholding dignity, independence and choice of older adults; championing full and meaningful lives for people with disabilities; and fostering stability and purpose for veterans and others.

Recently, funding for our valuable services has come under tremendous scrutiny. Funding has been halted without regard for the individuals whose needs are impacted and those that give their lives to serve them. At times, organizations have been called out on social media for receipt of funds without an understanding of how the money is used to make a positive impact on families and our communities. Medicaid, which covers the cost of services for low-income individuals, older adults, children and individuals with disabilities, is consistently in the cross hairs when setting national and state budget priorities.

Though these are difficult and tumultuous times, I am heartened by the outpouring of support for Lutheran and other faith-based organizations. Communities are rallying around ministries to highlight the positive impact they make and how vital their work is in serving those less fortunate. They are pointing out the years of service and how these organizations have adapted to changing needs of society. Many, like Genacross, have been serving their communities for over 100 years.

Lutheran social ministries are beacons of light, calling all of us to serve. Though the ground beneath us may shift, our commitment to compassion and services remains steadfast. As we take each step, whether firm or faltering, we do not walk alone. God's presence sustains us in every moment of service, every act of love, and every offering of hope.

In Memory of Michael J. Hollie Sr. (1938-2025)

enacross Lutheran Services lost a faithful servant when Michael J. Hollie Sr., a former member of the Genacross Board of Directors and a loyal donor, passed away on January 10, 2025.

Mr. Hollie served two terms on the parent board, from 2012-2020. Over the years, he served on numerous board committees, including the Governance and Nominating committees. Prior to joining the parent board, he had served two full terms on the Genacross Lutheran Services Foundation Board, concluding as its president.

"Michael was on the board when I arrived at Genacross and served for a few years thereafter," stated Rick Marshall, President/CEO. "He was a good man who led a dynamic life. His band played at the retirement party for Dave Roberts, my predecessor, and Genacross was honored to serve him in the Health Center at our Wolf Creek Campus at one point as well."

Mr. Hollie worked as an insurance agent for 38 years before retiring in 1999. He also was an avid jazz musician and drummer, as well as a man of strong faith. He had been an active member of St. Philip Lutheran Church in Toledo, Ohio, for decades. He served many years on the finance board at the church and as chairman of the church and/or head elder.



Besides Genacross, he served his community as a member of the board of the Neighborhood Improvement Foundation of Toledo, later becoming its chairman. In addition, he served as regional governor for Toastmasters International and on the board of the African-American Legacy Project.

He is survived by his wife, Ireatha, of 34 years; his five children; 15 grandchildren; 21 great-grandchildren; and a host of other family and friends. A funeral service was held on January 21, 2025, at St. Philip.

After careful planning and with the help of resources, including Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) Toledo Core City funds – a grant program that supports the acquisition, rehabilitation and sale of properties to address blight, increase homeownership and stabilize neighborhood property values – NTR completed the targeted restorative efforts at each home by October 2024.

Renovations ranged from roofs, windows, driveway and foundation replacements, to remodels of kitchens and bathrooms. Once renovations were complete, NTR sold each home. The homes were all occupied by early 2025, with the initiative having created opportunities to access homeownership without the barriers of often costly and unexpected repair costs.

"It is rare that you get the opportunity to acquire and redevelop four houses in a row and create new homeowners. This is truly a transformative neighborhood project that shows the value of partnership for making a positive and lasting impact for Toledo," stated Tom Kroma, Executive Director of LISC Toledo.

For Genacross, LISC Toledo and NTR, the decision to pursue the project was clear. Aligned with each organization's mission, renovating the homes marked a milestone in the effort to revitalize local neighborhoods, fostering community stability and resilience for the benefit of current and future generations.

Year to Focus on Stewardship of Resources

uring 2025, Genacross Lutheran Services will be raising up its sixth and final Core Value: Stewardship of Resources. This value works in conjunction with the other Genacross values to help guide decisionmaking and shape the organization's culture.

Napoleon Campus Partners with Soaring Arts Studio

After months of restoration and more than a year of envisioning, the chapel at the Genacross Lutheran Services-Napoleon Campus has finally been renewed — and with it, a stunning new mural that tells a story of resilience, collaboration and artistry.

It all began with an unexpected disaster. A broken sprinkler head in the ceiling above the chapel unleashed a flood of water that poured into the chapel, lobby, surrounding offices, and even the bake shop of the Napoleon Campus. What followed was an extensive restoration process that stretched over eight long months. When the dust finally settled and the chapel was ready to welcome visitors again, one significant feature stood out — a large blank wall, waiting for a new beginning.

Casey Amonette, the Napoleon Campus Executive Director, was determined to bring beauty and inspiration back to the space and sought out a mural to grace the chapel wall. She connected with Soaring Arts Studio, a local nonprofit organization affiliated with the Filling Homes in Napoleon that empowers artists of all abilities to explore their talents and express themselves through the arts.

Filling Homes is a Four Lutheran Agencies of Northwestern Ohio ministry partner with Genacross, and this partnership enabled the organizations to collaborate on a project and benefit both of the populations they serve.

Using a small painting as inspiration, the Napoleon Campus worked closely with Soaring Arts Studio to recreate the

artwork on a larger scale. Six talented artists from the studio each took part in bringing the mural to life, carefully painting sections of the wall with dedication and skill. Their teamwork and creativity transformed the once blank space into a piece of art, adding warmth and meaning to the chapel.

"The final result is more than just a painting; it's a symbol of community, perseverance, and the power of art to restore not just buildings but spirits," said Mrs. Amonette. "We are incredibly grateful for the artists' hard work and the opportunity to collaborate with such a meaningful organization. This mural now stands as a reminder of the journey we've been through and the beauty that can emerge after a storm."
